Alabama Preservation Conference: Finding Your Historic Rhythm - April 24 - 26

The 2014 Alabama Preservation Conference will be rocking to the rhythm of historic preservation. The conference, scheduled for Thursday, April 24 through Saturday, April 26, will be held in the nation's rhythm and blues capital - the historic Shoals of Alabama. With the remarkable revival of the area and its influx of creative minds and forward-thinking community leaders and advocates, the Shoals is a living laboratory to examine the cultural and economic benefits of preservation.

The 2014 Alabama Preservation Conference has three very distinctive tracks for participants: Track 1 - The Rhythm and Beat of Restoring Alabama: Historic Tax Credits and Economic Incentives; Track 2 - Main Street Plus and All That Jazz: Reviving Alabama's Historic Downtowns and the Power of Transformation; and Track 3 - Preservation's Solos: Sessions to Strengthen Our Skill Set.

Track 1 - The Rhythm and Beat of Restoring Alabama: Historic Tax Credits and Economic Incentives features a hands-on workshop addressing the application process for Alabama's Historic Rehabilitation Tax Credit, complete with a full-complement of guest speakers discussing everything from planning successful projects, assembling application funding packages, meeting the Alabama Historical Commission's tax credit requirements, and an update on current legislation.

For Track 2 - Main Street Plus and All That Jazz: Reviving Alabama's Historic Downtowns and the Power of Transformation offers a full day with Main Street Alabama executive director Mary Helmer. This session includes the National Trust for Historic Preservation's Four-Point Main Street approach to downtown revitalization, a Social Media workshop, a panel discussion about business incubators and a walking tour of Main Street Florence businesses.

Track 3 - Preservation's Solos: Sessions to Strengthen Our Skill Set is made for those who enjoy exploring new concepts and ideas applied to historic preservation. Featured programs of this session include archiving and curating historic collections, a panel discussion about the benefits of heritage trails as cultural and economic engines as well an early glimpse at Alabama's forthcoming Bicentennial Celebration plans commemorating the 200th anniversaries of Alabama

becoming a U.S. Territory and state. A session on insuring historic properties is also on the slate.

New at this year's conference is Saturday morning's look at the building trades and how education can support historic preservation through curriculum development and linkage. Guest speakers will address the importance and need for the building trades and share success stories from their communities.

Opportunities for fun fill the refrain of the conference with a Merchant Stroll and Open House hosted by Florence Main Street, bus tours of the Shoal's famous music industry sites and studios, tours of period house museums, and some truly delicious food highlight the organic farm-to-table movement - a growing culinary trend involving heritage farms throughout the nation, especially in Alabama.

For the Alabama Trust Benefit Dinner on Thursday evening, visit one of the state's most historic privately owned farms for an alfresco dinner featuring cocktails, a wild game sampling, and dinner prepared by one of the Shoals most talented chefs, Alan Phillips of Red Clay Epicurean. Tickets are \$75 per person and reservations are required.

Don't miss the Friday night special screening of the much-applauded documentary *Muscle Shoals* on the UNA campus.

Preservation of B.B. Comer Bridge - Update

Attorneys for the Comer Bridge Foundation (CBF) and The N. Skunk River Greenbelt Association (NSRGA) are drafting an agreement that will authorize the two bridge-preservation groups to work collaboratively to save, preserve and repurpose the B.B. Comer Bridge, which crosses the Tennessee River near Scottsboro. When agreement is reached, the organizations will collaborate in submitting a plan for purchase to the Alabama

Department of Transportation, which currently owns the bridge.

Public support and interest in plans for re-adaptive uses of the bridge includes, among other, organizations the Alabama Department of Commerce, Alabama Film Office and Made In Alabama. Planners envision the B. B. Comer Bridge as a venue supporting human and wildlife habitats.

The B. B. Comer Bridge, completed in 1930, is the last of the 15 memorial toll bridges enacted by legislation in 1927 and built by the Kansas City Bridge Company under contract with Alabama State Bridge Corporation. Selected for the Alabama Register of Landmarks and Heritage in October 2013, the historic bridge is being submitted for national recognition by the Keeper of the National Register of Historic Places (NRHP).

Form Based Code for Historic Downtown Development - Yea or Nay

The Downtown Mobile Alliance is definitely on the yea side of this debate. Recent forums on the application of a Form Based Code for the redevelopment of a downtown neighborhood argues for a broader, yet more comprehensive approach to city planning. According to the Downtown Mobile Alliance, Form Based Codes represent a change in approach by focusing as much on the physical form of a building as it does on its use. This focus enhances the pedestrian experience by creating harmonious transitions between intensities of uses; it fosters an environment that encourages innovation and connected communities. It is an approach being adopted by municipalities across the country determined to create vibrant, competitive 21st century cities. Designed for middle and high school civics, government and history classes, *Project C: Lessons from the American Civil Rights Movement*, is a Web-interactive experience spanning three years - the first year featuring Birmingham events, the second and third years will focus on Selma and Montgomery events. Produced by Alabama Public Television, *Project C* takes students and

teachers online using historic Alabama Civil Rights events to teach the importance and practice of civic engagement.
